#### **Catholic House HVAC and Plumbing Updates**

During the fall and winter, we completed the major project of replacing the heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) system in Catholic House. After almost two decades, problems had become serious, with water dripping into some rooms.

After extensive evaluation and careful consideration, we selected a modern heat pump system. For guest safety and comfort, we also addressed concerns involving difficulty regulating water temperature in showers. It was cost-effective to handle HVAC and plumbing update projects together, given that both involved drywall work. The HVAC and plumbing work have been completed in time for the 2024 season. The total cost of these important updates was \$130,000. We applied for rebate incentives from National Grid, our electric supplier. After providing all necessary documentation, we received \$11,350 in rebates.

Catholic House, privately owned by the Chautauqua Catholic Community, receives no Diocesan support and is an essential resource for us to bring priests to Chautauqua to offer Mass, Reconciliation, and seminars throughout the program season. #### Religious Sisters to Visit Catholic House During Weeks 1 and 6

The Chautauqua Catholic Community provides scholarships to four religious women each year to spend one week at Catholic House. These experiences help the sisters to enrich their communities. The scholarship includes lodging, gate passes, parking, and a basic allowance for meals. We are thrilled to introduce this year's scholarship recipients. Sr. Mary Alyce Koval, OSU and Sr. Norma Raupple, OSU will visit during Week 1. Sr. Elaine Englert, SSJ and Sr. Carol Cimino, SSJ will visit during Week 6. **Sr. Mary Alyce Koval, OSU (Week 1)** served 28 years in Catholic schools as a teacher and as a principal. She served as Education Director at Beatitude House. This Youngstown, Ohio ministry of the Ursuline Sisters serves homeless women with children, helping them become successful through education, job training, and parenting classes. Since 2017, Sr. Mary Alyce has been serving as Diocesan Pastoral Associate at St. Luke Church in Boardman, Ohio. Sr. Mary Alyce loves reading, walking, cooking, and grocery shopping.



**Sr. Norma Raupple, OSU (Week 1)** taught at Catholic schools for 14 years and served as Director of Religious Education in three parishes. She worked with African American families in the inner city for ten years. She then served for ten years on a missionary project in Brownsville, Texas where she coordinated an English language program and established a sewing co-op. Since 2017, she has been working with immigrant families in Matamoros, Mexico, accompanying them and establishing a network where they can support each other. The sisters opened a health clinic in Matamoros. Through the Beatitude House ministry in Youngstown, Sr. Norma offers English language learning and an after-school and summer program for homeless women and children.

Sr. Elaine Englert, SSJ (Week 6) is a life-long educator. She has been a high school and elementary school teacher and administrator. Sr. Elaine created the Sisters of St. Joseph Women's Leadership Program at Acquinas Institute in Rochester. She previously served as Coordinator of the Motherhouse and was elected to the Leadership Team of the Sisters of St. Joseph. Sister Elaine is certified in spiritual direction from the Haden Institute through the Mt. Carmel Monastery in Ontario, Canada. Currently, she offers spiritual direction and volunteers in various ministries of the Sisters of St. Joseph.





**Sr. Carol Cimino, SSJ, EdD (Week 6)** has worked as a teacher and administrator in elementary and high schools. She served for 20 years as a member of the Catholic School Leadership Team at Manhattan College. She was the Director of the Catholic School Administrators Association of New York State and worked for Catholic School Management, Inc. and Sadlier Publishing. Sr. Carol served as superintendent of Catholic Schools in the Diocese of Buffalo and retired in 2018. She has since been an interim principal twice and does consulting and public speaking for dioceses around the country.

#### 2024 Catholic House Hosts

#### Mark and Bev Beltramo - Hosting Weeks 4, 5, and 6

Mark and Bev Beltramo bring a special type of spiritual leadership to Chautauqua. Bev is a Board-Certified Chaplain through the National Association of Catholic Chaplains (NACC) and recently completed six years on the NACC Executive Board.

Originally from California, Mark and Bev met as undergraduates at the University of Redlands in California, where Bev received a Bachelor of Music in Music Education and a BA in English. She earned her MA in Creative Studies from the State University of New York at Buffalo, where she first learned of Chautauqua. Bev went on to complete an MA in Pastoral Ministry from Assumption University in Windsor, Canada, and a Doctor of Ministry from Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit. Mark earned a BS in Math and Economics at the University of Redlands and a PhD in Engineering from Stanford University.



Married 41 years, Bev and Mark recently retired and moved back to California to be closer to family. Catholic House rents guest rooms for one-week periods during the program season. 2024 rental for a two-person room with private bath, air conditioning, and use of a shared kitchen is \$675 or \$775 per week. Gate passes, parking, and meals are not included.




